### **Sanctuary is... Holy, Welcoming, Safe** **Rev. Dr. Benjamin J. Broadbent, Lead Minister**

At our Annual Meeting in January, I suggested “sanctuary” would be our word of the year in at least these ways:

- With political storms raging, our spiritual practices help us build a “sanctuary” within where we can listen for God’s “still small voice” (1 Kings 19:12).
- As shingles fall, dry rot grows, and migratory bats take up residence, we are launching a capital campaign this fall to refurbish our “sanctuary” building.
- Responding to policies meant to intimidate and scapegoat immigrants, we have declared ourselves a “sanctuary” congregation.
- In the face of climate change and unchecked exploitation of the biosphere, “sanctuary” means changing our behaviors to protect habitats and Earth itself.

In the Bible, the Hebrew word we translate as “sanctuary” – *miqdash* – is uttered by Moses after crossing the Red Sea (Ex. 15:17). In Moses’s liberation song to the Israelites, God has taken up residence among the people in a sanctuary, God’s holy dwelling place. In the wilderness, this was a moveable sanctuary – think about the ark of the covenant. When the people eventually settle in Jerusalem, the sanctuary becomes the inner sanctum within the temple.

In an act that likely led to his arrest, Jesus enters the temple complex and overturns the tables of the money-changers, calling it a “den of robbers.” His rant is due to the exploitative practices of charging exorbitant fees to foreigners and barring eunuchs (i.e., those who are sexually different) from accessing proximity to the “sanctuary.” Jesus invokes Isaiah’s vision of the temple as a “house of prayer” that welcomes foreigners and eunuchs (Is. 56:3–7).

One of the great advances of the Protestant Reformation was known as the “storming of the sanctuary.” In the medieval church, only priests were allowed to enter the sanctuary, a screened-off area at the front of the church.

But reformers insisted on the “priesthood of all believers” and reimagined the church building itself as the sanctuary.

When I think of “sanctuary” today, I think of relationships that are holy, welcoming, and safe. In the presence of sanctuary, we can expect to encounter the living and loving God who makes a dwelling among people. We are to be as welcoming as Jesus, challenging the written and unwritten rules about who belongs. And we are to seek, create, and provide safety to the best of our ability, knowing that ultimate safety is found only inside the holy embrace of God. As followers of Jesus, we provide refuge from the howling winds, we welcome those whom others shun, and we protect the vulnerable, as best we can, from those who would seek to do them harm. We do this not only because we are stewards of a sanctuary located at 1000 Gravenstein Highway, but because we *are* God’s sanctuary people wherever we go.

## Belonging in America

Community Church recently voted to be a sanctuary church, committing to provide support for immigrants in our community. America's immigrant stories reach back into time and continue to touch us today. The issues shift, but the struggle to belong remains the same. **William Faulkner** wrote, "*The past is never dead. It's not even past.*" Currently, the US is experiencing a rise in the percentage of immigrant population similar to the turn of the last century. Similar to the start of the 1900s, there's a growing concern in the US about the effect immigrant populations have on the country.



Stepping inside the immigrant story of our past century can give us insight into the immigrant story of our own time. I was brought inside an immigrant story when listening to Gabriel Fauré's, "Après un rêve" (Op. 7, No. 1). The music evokes a sense of longing and loss, it is full of depth and soul with an element of sweetness. Listening to it reminded me of the afternoon **Michael** and I sat overlooking the Gulf of Naples at sunset as a single boat pulled away over the horizon. Watching the boat, I sensed what it must have felt like for Michael's grandparents as over a hundred years ago the boat they sailed on slipped across the horizon into the Tyrrhenian Sea. Their homeland shrinking, then dissolving behind them, they headed for Ellis Island, to a country they'd never even seen a photo of. They never again returned to Italy.

After writing the poem in response to Fauré's music, I wondered what their boat journey was like, and was curious what life was like when they arrived. Questions led to research, additional poems, further questions, and more research. I wanted to understand a history I was never told and hadn't learned in school. I didn't know that the largest recorded earthquake in Europe to date took place in Messina in 1908, or that Italian American citizens in the Bay Area had to register as Enemy Aliens and weren't allowed to travel more than five miles from their homes during WW2. Eventually, I realized I was writing a book.

After a life-threatening moment at the turn of the last century, **Gaetano**, a barber, leaves Calabria, Italy, and immigrates to San Francisco to start a new life so his wife, **Luisa**, can join him later. Enter San Francisco's turn of the century world through the eyes of an Italian immigrant family as they cope with complex challenges to their traditional way of life during a time of speakeasies, government corruption, natural disaster, the opening of the Golden Gate, and neighbors being sent to internment camps. Making a home while living between worlds can fulfill dreams. It can also cost you your life. Narrated in several character's voices, the book tells the story of people between worlds searching for how to redefine themselves and feel at home as they encounter celebrations and delights, as well as losses, difficulty, and disaster.

You're invited to consider what it means to be American, reflect on what carries us through transition's hardship, and to join an Italian immigrant family in their journey between worlds as we read, discuss, and listen to readings from *A Space Between*. (Bordighera Press, City University New York, 2019.) We'll meet three times during Faith Formation hour, in the chapel May 4, May 11, and May 18. Books will be available at Faith Formation.


